

In the September issue of the Observer (Letters to the Editor), reference was made to the minutes of the 20 July 2011 meeting. The item concerned recorded the remarks of a parishioner during the allotted time for the public to speak. It was not the opinion of the parish council.

For clarification, the following should be noted.

1. The parish council takes the situation at Steppes Hill Road, Aerodrome Approach and Aerodrome Industrial Estate very seriously. Members have discussed ways forward, and the chairman has been working closely with Maidstone Borough Council and the Police to find a solution which is both practical and enforceable.
2. The lack of positive action being taken by the authorities to deal with the continuing anti-social activities within the parish, especially at Steppes Hill Road, Aerodrome Approach and Aerodrome Industrial Estate is cause for extreme concern. Well before the closure of Longreach layby, anti-social behaviour was occurring at these locations.
3. In recent years, closure of Steppes Hill Road was provisionally agreed with Kent Highways as a measure to stop anti-social behaviour, but this was vetoed by the then KCC Cabinet Member for Highways, Cllr. Keith Ferrin. Since that decision, continual efforts have been made to have this unacceptable situation dealt with.
4. At a site meeting held in March 2011, representatives from the Police, KCC, MBC and the parish council fully discussed possible actions, including record photographs, and a report was promised. This has not been received. The MBC officer at the meeting has left his post and a new officer assigned to the case.
5. The parish council has written to the owners of The Three Squirrels public house (now closed) but has had no response.
6. The parish council wishes to see Steppes Hill Road closed in order to stop these unacceptable anti-social activities. Alternatively, for security measures to be taken to stop all parking and access to the adjacent private woodland.

STOCKBURY CRICKET CLUB IN ASSOCIATION WITH HARTLIP CC

After a long and challenging season and Stockbury's first for a long time in the KVCL league, this improving side has come into form at the seasons end, winning their first league game against New Ifield and a very competitive friendly against the in-form Pegasus CC. The rain affected 30 over league game saw New Ifield win the toss and bat first, yet Stockbury's opening bowlers Tom Bulbrook and Nick Emery did a good job of restricting New Ifield, with Nick taking 2-31, before Stockbury veteran Nigel Sharp (3-19) produced a match winning spell of bowling. New Ifield set a competitive target of 130 to win from 30 overs, but Stockbury started the chase comfortably with contributions from Dan Bulbrook (17), Tom Bulbrook (21) and a strong half century from Oscar Ratcliffe. Wickets fell late on, but Dan Oates (16*) kept a cool head to get Stockbury over the line.

Stockbury hosted what turned out to be an extremely entertaining and competitive friendly with an inform Pegasus CC. Having lost the toss, Pegasus were put into bat and were restricted by opening bowlers Tom Bulbrook and Nick Emery on a difficult batting surface. Pegasus went onto to slowly recover, before Stockbury's first change bowlers Joe Martin (3-29) and Simon Clare (3-15) strangled the scoring, and took 3 wickets a piece, as good bowling and fantastic team fielding produced a collapse of 50-1 to 85 all out, with Tom Bulbrook coming back strong and taking two wickets himself. Therefore Stockbury were set a total of 86 to win, and that chase began straight away, with an hour still before tea.

Stockbury openers Daniel Bulbrook and Simon Clare began steadily and cautiously, getting off to a good start on a difficult pitch, before Simon mistimed a drive and was caught, leaving Stockbury 30-1. This soon became 30-2 as Tom Bulbrook was the victim of an almost unplayable delivery and 31-3 when Nick Emery was bowled first ball. Jon Brignall came to the crease and departed not long after, and Stockbury went into tea at 50-4, with Dan Bulbrook and Oates at the crease.

When both teams emerged after tea, a great contest ensued. Dan Oates found a fielder when attempting to go over the top and Sam Martin was bowled by the same Pegasus spinner soon after, while opener Dan Bulbrook resisted and kept the scoreboard ticking along as these Stockbury wickets continued to fall. Dan and Joe Martin added valuable runs to the total, before Dan eventually fell having top scored with 39, departing with the score at 77-7, just 9 runs away from victory. Young Mark Collins was the 8th wicket and Joe the 9th, as Stockbury were reduced to 81-9. Connor Young then had the privilege of hitting the valuable winning runs, striking a boundary to the level the scores, and running a single to take the game, in a pulsating finish.

Theft: Construction pipeline, Church Hill - compactor (rammer) (Clancy Docwra); Magpie Hall Farm, Hazel Street - 700 litres heating oil; Oast House, South Street Road - Dog stolen, then recovered. An arrest was made.

Burglary: Garage, Rumstead Lane - generator, welder, disc cutter, chainsaw.

Steppes Hill Road. If the road were not closed, bunds could be built to stop illegal parking. The junction with A249 was a safety issue. The chairman and Cllr. Tomsett had inspected the area, including the nature reserve, and found little rubbish. It transpired that MBC had cleared the rubbish a few days before, and the chairman was contacting Environmental Services for more information.

8. Highway matters

Cllr. Whittle reported: A249 Action Group meeting. There was need for a roundabout at the Showground which she was taking forward. A second roundabout was necessary at Stockbury.

The chairman reported a summary of accidents showed a reduction in numbers although an increase at the Stockbury end. 50 mph limit.

9. Core Strategy

The chairman explained briefly how the AONB could be affected. The Strategy was inconsistent but it was necessary to study it and report back. A sub committee was formed, Cllrs. Woods (chairman), Tomsett and Collins.

10. Planning

Application 11/1331 Court Farm, Yelsted Lane: 1st floor extension and other external changes. **Recommended Approval.** It is noted that neither MBC nor adjoining neighbours had been consulted prior to applying. The parish council would be interested to know if any neighbours have complained.

11/1086 Farriers, Pett Road (reported in minutes 17 August 2011). It had been established that a condition remained that the annex building cannot be used as a separate dwelling.

11. Finance

a) Concurrent Functions: the new return form was accepted (proposed J. Collins, seconded P. Woods).

b) Stockbury PC No.2 Account: Although the parish council had sent written authority for statements to be sent to Cllr. Tomsett, the bank was still confusing the issue and sending statements to Cllr. Cockett. The clerk would write a strong letter requesting immediate action.

c) Cheque numbers 001331 to 001334 and 001336 and 001337 were signed (proposed D. Tomsett, seconded J. Collins). Cheque 001330 Audit Commission was held over for further information. Cheque 001335 was spoiled and destroyed.

12. External Reports

a) Cllr. Whittle (KCC) reported: Her KCC member funding was still available; in this respect, Cllr. Tomsett was awaiting figures for traffic calming in the village.

b) Concurrent Functions: There continues to be confusion as to whether there will or will not be reductions in 2012. Further information awaited.

13. Correspondence

Parish Independent Remuneration Panel, Members' allowances: noted but does not apply to Stockbury. Kent Downs AONB Managing Land for Horses to councillors for information. Kent Wildlife Trust: response regarding the chalk spread on the reserve at Queendown Warren. Balfour Beatty, M2 roundabout, stating that traffic lights would remain.

14. Any other business



Prison Outreach – Uganda

In Uganda there is a group of unpaid volunteers who have NGO status and visit prisons at their own expense.

In order to carry out this work support and finance are required. Bibles in local languages are needed and basic goods such as sugar and soap are also needed by prisoners and staff in rural prisons.

The Rev. Ken George, a prison chaplain on the Isle of Sheppey, is a Patron of the group and travels there every two years to support their ministry. Whilst there he has contact with a school which takes in orphans. He takes school stationery and equipment and when possible he takes clothes to give away.

Also he is in contact with the Single Parent Association of Uganda. Many of these families have only one parent as a result of the Aids epidemic.

We look forward to seeing you in support of this voluntary work.

Fuel theft – Kent Police General Advice

Police are urging those who store fuel to be extra vigilant. This includes businesses, schools and farms.

The rise in fuel prices may result in an increase of thefts of fuel, not only from fuel pumps and fuel tanks but from storage areas too.

Businesses are advised to avoid parking up lorries with **full** fuel tanks overnight. An alternative could be to rethink where lorries are parked and the accessibility of the tanks.

Consider anti-siphon devices and regularly review security around your premises. Fuel storage containers should be kept locked and alarmed where possible.

Residents are advised to keep vehicles in a garage overnight. Alternatively, make sure vehicles are parked in a well-lit area with the fuel tank facing away from the street. Consider locking fuel caps and using anti-siphon devices.

For crime prevention advice, call the non-emergency number and ask to be put through to your local **crime reduction officer**. 01622 690690
